While the paper lists harms associated with divorce, the analysis lacks depth. Incorporating quantitative data or case studies could provide a more nuanced understanding of these issues.

A comparative analysis of the effects of divorce across different cultural or socio-economic backgrounds could offer valuable insights.

The discussion on gender-specific impacts is insightful but could be expanded by integrating theories of gender roles and societal expectations to explain these differences.

The paper lacks a dedicated section for recommendations and future research directions. Providing specific, actionable suggestions for policymakers, educators, and counselors based on the findings could greatly enhance its practical value.

The reference list is adequate but updating it with the latest research and ensuring all cited literature is accurately represented within the text would improve the paper's credibility.

Ensuring adherence to a consistent citation style throughout the manuscript is necessary for academic integrity.

The manuscript's readability could be improved by addressing grammatical errors and ensuring clarity in the presentation of ideas.

Organizing the paper into clearly defined sections with subheadings would enhance its flow and make it more readerfriendly.

While not explicitly mentioned, the paper should address ethical considerations, especially when discussing vulnerable populations such as children affected by divorce.
