

1.1. Reviewer 1

Reviewer:

The phenomenological approach is well-chosen for exploring elderly wishes. However, the methodology section needs expansion on participant selection criteria to ensure representativeness and to address potential biases in sample selection.

While the study employs a detailed interpretive analysis method, it would benefit from a more rigorous description of the analysis process, including how themes were identified and validated.

The interpretation of findings is insightful but requires deeper analysis. Specifically, exploring how these wishes align with or diverge from existing literature on elderly well-being and how cultural contexts influence these wishes would enrich the discussion.

The study suggests health maintenance and family support should be prioritized in care strategies. This recommendation could be further developed by providing specific, actionable strategies for policymakers and practitioners.

The limitations section should address the study's scope within a specific cultural and geographical context and its implications for generalizability. Additionally, future research directions could include quantitative studies to measure the prevalence and intensity of these wishes across different populations.
